1	Welcome, introductions and apologies for absence	
2	<p>Minutes of the last meeting and matters arising</p> <p>Spitting in the street – Regarding Adrienne Tobias’ question on spitting in the street, Detective Superintendent Shabnam Chaudhri clarified by email that if witnessed by an officer they can ask the person to refrain from spitting. If they don’t refrain then public order offences can be considered.</p> <p>John Richards added that council enforcement officers can also issue fines.</p> <p>Serious Violence Summit - Invitations have been sent out to schools, cabinet members, politicians and voluntary sector organisations.</p> <p>Hate Crime Panel – Kishan and Khatira fed back that the panel was useful and they gained a lot of insight. Topics covered included FGM and violence against women and girls.</p>	
3	<p>Knife crime presentation – Chief Inspector Lisa Butterfield, MPS</p> <p>Knife crime and robbery have increased in Redbridge. These often go hand in hand. Robbery is up 100 offences in the last year.</p> <p>Since February 2018, a large number of young people have been victims of stabbings and murders across London. This is a pan-London issue and is being tackled Met-wide.</p> <p>MPS uses Stop and Search as a tool in preventing knife crime. Stop and Search in Redbridge has almost doubled. Previously</p>	<p>LB to provide data on positive outcomes at the next meeting.</p>

	<p>MPS carried out around 40 stop and searches across the borough in a week. This has steadily increased month on month and in April 2019, 509 searches were carried out.</p> <p>A current focus in Redbridge is revisiting stop and search powers, retraining officers on how to use them and increasing confidence among officers.</p> <p>Stop and search isn't the only approach to searching for weapons. MPS are also carrying out both officer-led and community led weapon sweeps. MPS are keen to work more closely with the community, including increasing Street Watch in Redbridge.</p> <p>MPS have also increased patrols around schools. Officers have powers to carry out searches in public areas and schools are being urged to carry out their own searches.</p> <p>County lines and exploitation in schools are also current priorities. As well as increasing patrols around schools, MPS is providing schools officers who do talks and presentations in schools. Officers are allocated by need and demand/risk.</p> <p>Deb Selner shared a newspaper article about the impact of witnessing domestic violence on young people, and the links between witnessing or experiencing domestic violence in childhood and becoming caught up in crime.</p> <p>John Richards explained that there are many credible studies which have found links between adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and knife crime. Bringing this knowledge into the borough and putting the right support in place is a key priority for the council.</p> <p>ACEs are a focus of the knife crime action plan and LBR was recently awarded £500k from central government to build positive activities in the borough.</p>	<p>LB to arrange for Schools Officer to present on their work at the next meeting.</p>
<p>4</p>	<p>Police update and performance</p> <p>Co-chair Julie Bradley proposed that the Board move on to the council update as much of the police update had been provided during the knife crime presentation.</p>	
<p>5</p>	<p>Council update</p> <p>The council now has a minimum of 4 enforcement officers and one senior officer/manager in addition to one sergeant and 3</p>

	<p>PCs from MPS tackling on-street prostitution. Changes to shift patterns have been introduced to increase visibility.</p> <p>LBR was the first council to put in place a public spaces protection order and can issue fines for kerb crawling. To date around 150 fixed penalty orders have been issued.</p> <p>LBR is working much more closely with the local community, including training up and providing equipment for Street Watch in Loxford. New communications have been developed and are being handed out in the area. There is also a walkabout planned in a few weeks' time to identify problematic hotspots.</p> <p>The increase in on-street enforcement has increased activity off- street, including flyers and stickers on lamp posts promoting sex trade. This is being investigated.</p> <p>Many of the women along Ilford Lane are criminally exploited or victims of trafficking from Eastern European countries with no recourse to public funds. It's a very complex issue which requires a longer term solution.</p>	
6	<p>MOPAC project updates</p> <p>Victim Support - 122 of 500 residents have been sent door and window alarms in Redbridge.</p> <p>Every resident who is referred to VS is contacted and offered door and window alarms, however take up has been lower than anticipated. Staff and volunteers have attended outreach events and are working with partners to promote the project. 20 new referrals have been received since January 2019. Residents who have taken up the offer of door and window alarms have stated that they feel more secure and there have been no reports of repeat burglaries.</p> <p>One Place East – The Training Stars have delivered all 20 sessions, reaching 558 school children in the borough. Overall, the project continues to be extremely well received by both school staff and children. The sessions included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Emphasising what disabled and non-disabled people have in common as opposed to what makes them different. • Increasing children's awareness of how hurtful comments can be and explaining that it can actually be a criminal offence (hate crime).

	<p>The Training Stars project has been successful in meeting their outcomes of increasing the children’s knowledge disability and hate crime.</p> <p>Through the delivery of the project, Training Stars have continued to grow in skills and confidence and all have expressed their enthusiasm to continue this work in the future.</p> <p>HEET – Awaiting monitoring report. Jenny has re-sent the request and will include an update in the next SNB meeting.</p> <p>19/20 Project Funding – We received 9 applications for 19/20 and have submitted our draft application to MOPAC for comment. They are experiencing some slippage due to a review of the funding formula and the move to an online application portal. The timetable has been updated to reflect the delay and MOPAC are reviewing draft applications until 7th June. Following this, applications will be reviewed by RSNB based on feedback from MOPAC.</p>	<p>JE to give update at the next meeting.</p>
<p>7</p>	<p>Discussion on letter to the Mayor on Neighbourhood Crime</p> <p>Deb Selner raised that people in the community have expressed a loss of confidence in 101. The online reporting system can create barriers and become a stumbling block.</p> <p>Deb added that people may not be reporting crime because they know the police are stretched and feel ‘nothing will happen’ as they’re aware of limited resources. There have been complaints that the police aren’t able to prioritise smaller issues e.g. stolen mobile phones.</p> <p>Sergeant Kim Hollenberg raised the importance of reporting, adding that if people don’t report crimes, however small, there is no record of the issue or record of the need.</p> <p>Chief Inspector Lisa Butterfield added that community engagement and raising awareness of opportunities to influence is a priority.</p> <p>Deb raised that fewer people are attending Ward Panels. Sergeant Kim Hollenberg advised that there are other opportunities to influence in addition to Ward Panels. This includes the website, where people can vote on local priorities using their postcode.</p>

	<p>Cllr Bob Littlewood added that there has been a lot of interest in volunteering for Street Watch which is very positive and demonstrates that people are aware that the police can't do everything and want to be involved in creating safer neighbourhoods.</p>	
<p>8</p>	<p>Feedback from any other bodies</p> <p>Victim Support are introducing pre-trial visits to support victims to prepare for court. Staff and volunteers are currently being trained.</p> <p>Khatira recently attended a youth panel on stop and search at City Hall. Many felt it wasn't a long term solution to preventing knife crime. Young people agreed it had some use, but felt early interventions would have a bigger impact. Many of the young people had personal experience of being stopped and searched and felt like they were being racially profiled.</p> <p>Chief Inspector Lisa Butterfield advised that there is a complaints procedure for stop and search. Camera footage is also reviewed by community stop and search groups.</p>



Therefore, adding up all the hate crime categories may result in multiple counting of a single offence.




Public Perceptions over time for Redbridge residents
