1.	<p><b>Welcome, introduction and apologies for absence</b></p> <p>The Chair, Julie Bradley, welcomed everyone to the meeting. She informed the members of the recent death of one member, John Walden from Neighbourhood Watch. <p><b>2.</b></p>	<p><b>Minutes of last meeting – 11 April 2018 and matters arising</b> The minutes were agreed as a true record of the meeting and signed by the Chair.</p> <p><b>Matters arising:</b> There were no matters arising.</p>	
<p><b>3.</b></p>	<p><b>Stop &amp; Search demonstration</b> Unfortunately the young people from Frenford Clubs did not attend, but the Youth Council representatives took part in the demonstration given by Sai and Zebby on how and Stop &amp; Search's should be done. Lee gave an introduction into why S&amp;S is necessary power for the police, particularly in relation to tackling knife &amp; gun crime. However, the police must use the power lawfully. This will be under one of the following pieces of legislation:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• S1 Police and Criminal Evidence Act</li> <li>• S47 Firearms Act</li> <li>• S60 Public Order Act</li> <li>• S43 Terrorism Act</li> <li>• S23 Misuse of Drugs Act</li> </ul> <p>The officer has to have a genuine suspicion that they will find what they are looking for, and body cameras should be recording. Police use the GOWISELY mnemonic which stands for:</p> <p>G: Grounds for the search O: Object the officer is searching for W: Warrant, particularly if the officer is in plain clothes I: Identification, proof that the officer is indeed a police officer! S: Station to which the officer is attached E: Entitlement, any citizen being searched by a police officer is entitled to copies of all paperwork L: Legislation, the legal power which gives the officer the right to stop and search Y: "YOU are being detained for the search or for the purpose of..." - essentially informing the individual in no uncertain terms the purpose and nature of the search</p> <p>A question was raised as to whether a person had to be searched by an officer of the same gender. The answer was no, but if objections are raised by the individual they can be taken to a police station for the search to be performed there.</p>	



	<p>Sai and Zebby demonstrated two different scenarios where a search may take place. One of a person seen jumping over a garden wall in an area where there had been a number of burglaries, and one involving a car driver stopped where drugs were smelt when questioning him. Members were invited to express their views as to whether the police had the right to stop &amp; search in both cases.</p> <p>The officers were thanked for their presentation.</p>	
<p><b>4.</b></p>	<p><b>Police Update – Shabnam Chaudhri and Lee Canter</b></p> <p>It was reported that crime rates were rising across the whole of the MPS.</p> <p>In Redbridge:        Burglary had seen a 50% reduction from January 2018 to June 2018. 374 incidents in January, 157 in June. This was due to Operation Mexico.        Robbery has been going up in the last 12 months, and Operation Mexico is being extended to take on this aspect as well.        Operation Sceptre aims to address violent crime.        Other operations in place to address prostitution in Ilford Lane and violent crime robbery in Ilford Town Centre. The local authority have got a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) in place in Ilford Lane meaning on the spot fines can be issued. The police and local authority are working closely together to enforce this, and “Kerb crawlers will be arrested” signs are in place. Khyer reported that the PSPO covers Clementswood, Loxford and Valentines wards and relates to street drinking, ASB, aggressive begging, public urination and other issues. £80 fines are issued, with no possibility of reduction.</p> <p>Shabnam reported on the 3 officers, funded by the Home Office, recruited for Ilford Town Centre wards from September as part of the Police Now initiative. They are new graduates with a 2 year contract.</p>	
<p><b>5.</b></p>	<p><b>Council update – Harveil Toor</b></p> <p>Harveil began by reporting on the implementation of the Our Streets Our Neighbourhood scheme which arose from the Redbridge Streets Commission. Neighbourhood Engagement and Education Officers have been appointed for the borough. They are: South – Sarah Kaye, North – Stephanie Orell, East – Tracy Scott, West – Brian McGloughlin. They are to be invited to a future meeting.</p>	<p>Liz</p>
<p><b>6.</b></p>	<p><b>Unauthorised encampments presentation – Harveil Toor</b></p> <p>Harveil began by saying that Redbridge had been suffering from lots of unauthorised encampments, mainly because neighbouring boroughs already had injunctions in place to move them on. It could take up to 2 weeks for the Council to get the necessary court order to allow them to evict them.</p>	



In response to this, the Council put in place dedicated staff resources tasked with getting an injunction for Redbridge. This is needed because:

- Incursions increased from around 10 per year to 40 in 2017/18
- From 10 to 25 caravans and upwards of 60 people
- Massive increase in fly tipping
- Increase in ASB and community impact
- LA costs in 2017/18 approx. £200k & private business £140k disclosed
- 

What is an injunction?

- High Court Injunction pursuant to (*Sec 222 Local Government Act 1972, Sec 187B Town & Country planning Act 1990, Sec 1 Anti -Social Behaviour Crime policing Act 2014*) to combat the unlawful trespass and encampment on Council /Private land
- Redbridge will be the 11<sup>th</sup> LA in the country to get an injunction
- Havering and Thurrock just started process
- With each successful injunction comes increased scrutiny and challenge
- Gives the power to instruct them to leave within two hours or face arrest

The injunction process:

- 2 Officers full time since November 2017
- Also involved police, planning, Business Intelligence Team, Vision, Comms and Legal
- 44 statements to ID issues
- 1000's of pages of evidence from databases (largely police, council and land registry)
- 100 named offenders identified
- 235 sites protected
- Full Equality Impact Assessment undertaken

Injunction dates:

- 24/4/18 – High court gave permission to notify 100 named individuals and the 235 sites of the upcoming injunction
- 4/6/18 - Successful trip to high court for interim injunction with very strong comments from Lady Justice Amanda Yip. 70 individuals and 235 sites included. Power of arrest given (unusual for interim injunction).
- LBR land now protected – and it works. First put to test with incursion onto Hainault Forest Country Park 11/6/18

Enforcement process:

- If you see an unauthorised encampment call the Enforcement Team on 0208 478 4679. If out of hours, call police on 101



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• If the High Court injunction protects the occupied land</li> <li>• police and council visit and give 2 hours to leave</li> <li>• Welfare checks done</li> <li>• In LBBB trespassers have never failed to leave</li> <li>• If they don't leave, Police try and pool BCU resources to enforce/arrest</li> <li>• If not enough resources to do this safely from BCU resources (dependant on other priorities and size of encampment) – escalate for central reserves/TSG</li> <li>• If no central resources re-assess 3 times a day until it can be resourced</li> </ul> <p>Next steps:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Now: Complete signage/service of current interim injunction</li> <li>• Continued engagement with the Gypsy and Traveller Forum</li> <li>• October/November: Full injunction hearing. If successful, Redbridge will have a full injunction in place (possibly for a set period like Enfield – 3 years; or indefinitely like LBBB)</li> <li>• Nov/Dec – if successful re-sign/re-serve</li> </ul> <p>In response to a question about whether they would try to occupy sites within the borough which aren't covered by the injunction, Harveil responded that it is more likely they will decide it is too hard and go elsewhere. She commented that these groups of travellers are involved in organised crime which takes place in the form of flytipping. The Enforcement Team aim to use their available resources in the best possible way for maximum effect.</p>	
<p><b>7.</b></p>	<p><b>MOPAC SNB funding 2018/2019 project reports</b></p> <p>All funding bides were successful, but there were no progress reports as the first tranche of money has not yet been received from MOPAC.</p> <p>Liz reported that one of the successful bids was for RedbridgeCVS to hold a third Community Day which would take place on 30 August. Flyers were distributed and she asked for those who are able to help in any way to contact her.</p>	
<p><b>8.</b></p>	<p><b>Feedback from any other bodies</b></p> <p>Julie spoke about her visits to a number of ward panels.</p> <p>Nicholas referred to the commendation ceremony for local police officers which had taken place at Frenford the day before.</p> <p>Kishan reported that the Youth Council's annual consultation with young people begins in September. 12 schools signed up to participate and a meeting to be held during the coming weekend would decide on what issues it should cover. A London wide Youth Assembly is holding its first meeting during August. A Healthy Relationships workshop is taking place</p>	



	<p>during the coming weekend. A young people friendly audit of the borough is taking place over the summer.</p> <p>Tara reported that Victim Support are supporting MOPAC with their victims of crime survey.</p> <p>Noel reported that the very successful police contact sessions continue at the Harvester in Chadwell.</p> <p>Stuart commented that he appreciates the regular contact he has with police officers which fosters good relationships between Councillors and SNT officers. He also commented that Seven Kings and Chadwell are hoping to provide Streetwatch training.</p> <p>Habib reported that the police Independent Advisory Group (IAG) is looking for new members to represent the diversity of our community. Particularly looking to attract women and young people. Their role is to act as critical friends to the police.</p>	
<p><b>9.</b></p>	<p><b>Questions from the public</b></p> <p>A question was asked about the ANPR cameras being installed which was mentioned at the public meeting in May organised by Mike Gapes MP. The questioner wanted to know if there was any update. Cllr Chowdhury replied that the needs analysis was complete; the cameras (which are tailor made) had been ordered and were expected in 6-8 weeks. The questioner said the promise had been made during the election that there would be 16 ANPR cameras and additional CCTV. There was discussion about where the cameras would be located and how these would be allocated. This information will not be made public, but they will be deployed according to identified priorities. Council are also working with Crossrail and The Exchange to have access to their cameras.</p> <p>Someone else asked if Operation Mexico was stopping. Shabnam replied that it is not, but it is being given a new name and including robbery as well as burglary.</p>



# BOROUGH COMPARISON DASHBOARD



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


Public Perceptions over time for **Redbridge** residents



Satisfaction trends over time for victims of crime from Redbridge


